"Epiphany" comes from a Greek word meaning "showing forth, appearance, manifestation, revelation." On January 6th we recognize the Manifestation, (or revelation) of Christ to the Gentiles when the three kings arrived with gifts for the newborn Jesus.

The Feast of the Epiphany is followed by the "Sundays after the Epiphany." The length of this season of Epiphany varies from four to nine Sundays, depending on the date of Easter. Its themes are light, stars, and gifts.







Then the Ministers and People may greet one another in the name of the Lord.



The people remain standing. The Celebrant, whether bishop or priest, faces them and sings or says,




Then, facing the Holy Table, the Celebrant proceeds

Bright shining God, inner light of all faithful souls, we celebrate your gifts of love, creation, and beauty. We rejoice that you have made us in your image and call us to live in your limitless love.

You bring people to the dawn of your rising. You sent your only child, our morning star, to light a way in our night and lead us to justice and peace. Your Holy Spirit shines good news into our lives.

Each daybreak you call us to feed the hungry, bring recovery of sight, liberate the oppressed, heal the brokenhearted and bind up their wounds, and keep watch for the dawn of your commonwealth on earth.

For all of this we give you thanks. And we praise you, joining our voices with all life on earth and the company of heaven, who forever sing their hymns to proclaim the glory of your name:



The people stand or kneel.

Then the Celebrant continues

At the following words concerning the bread, the Celebrant is to hold it, or to lay a hand upon it; and at the words concerning the cup, to hold or place a hand upon the cup and any other vessel containing wine to be consecrated.

On the night he was betrayed, Jesus took bread, and after giving thanks broke it and gave it to his disciples, saying, Take, eat; this is my body given for you. Whenever you do this, do it in remembrance of me.

After supper, he took the cup, saying,
This cup is the new covenant, sealed in my blood,
shed for you for the forgiveness of sins.
Whenever you drink it, do it in remembrance of me.

This is the mystery of faith:



Pour out your Holy Spirit on all gathered here, that we might be your light in the world.

Pour out your Holy Spirit on these gifts of bread and wine, that we might be infused with the gift of your nourishing guidance.

Transform us with your sustaining grace, even as we eat of this bread and drink of this wine.

Transfigure us to be your presence in the world, even as we are redeemed and reclaimed by your great love. By your Spirit, make us one with Christ, one with each other, and one in ministry to the world.

By Christ, and with Christ, and in Christ, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honor and glory is your, Almighty Father, now and forever.


People and Celebrant

Facing the people, the Celebrant says the following Invitation The Gifts of God for the People of God.

The ministers receive the Sacrament in both kinds, and then immediately deliver it to the people

The Bread and the Cup are given to the communicants with these words

The Body (Blood) of our Lord Jesus Christ keep you in everlasting life. [Amen.]

or with these words

The Body of Christ, the bread of heaven. [Amen.] The Blood of Christ, the cup of salvation. [Amen.]

During the ministration of Communion, hymns, psalms, or anthems may be sung.

After Communion, the Celebrant says Let us pray.

In gratitude, O God,
we have come to your table,
into your presence, into your house.
For all that you have done for us,
the invitation, the robe
the bread, the wine, the Word, the song,
for bringing us into the light of Jesus Christ,
we offer our thanks and praise.
